## Agenda Item 21.03.14 Climate Change Group:

# Proposal for Stradbroke Parish Council to declare a climate emergency- Proposer Toni Wisbey.

IPCC report and context

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) released a special report in October 2018 on the subject of 'Global Warming of 1.5°C'. It found:

- Human activity has already caused 1°C of warming to the earth.
- To limit warming to 1.5°C it will be necessary to halve global carbon emissions by 2030 and to achieve net zero emissions (carbon neutrality) by 2050. Scientists now agree that this report seriously underestimated global CO2 emissions, the rate and extent of Arctic meltdown and feedback effects such as ocean acidification and tundra emissions of methane.

Over three-quarters of UK county councils, including Suffolk, and the National Association of Local Councils have declared a climate emergency to be carbon neutral by 2030. Stradbroke Parish Council, in following their example to declare a climate emergency, is taking leadership to encourage others in these steps towards climate change adaptation and mitigation.

Stradbroke can play an important part in Mid Suffolk in leading the way towards reducing global carbon emissions and providing a more sustainable and healthy natural and human environment to encourage biodiversity. Nature is severely threatened by climate change, causing drought and extreme, unpredictable weather conditions. It is altering natural cycles too quickly for wildlife to cope. By our leadership we can encourage other villages and towns to provide a network of sustainability across Mid Suffolk to mitigate effects.

By declaring a climate emergency: Stradbroke acknowledges the urgency for global society to reduce carbon emissions and foster our well-being.

We recognise the part which we have to play and commit to taking an active role in achieving this, by, for example:

- Pro-actively reducing our CO2 emissions as an organisation and encouraging others to do the same.
- Employing explicit climate change considerations in Stradbroke Parish Council planning, decision-making, recommendations and activities.
- Empowering our community. Stradbroke is rich in energetic, pro-active individuals, groups, organisations and businesses. We will be seeking ideas from them, raising awareness, supporting and sharing vision and direction to decrease our village's carbon emissions and improve our village resilience to climate change, (such as protecting and encouraging biodiversity and combating threats to plant and wildlife).

Our emphasis will be on a healthier life for us all and particularly the children of today for their tomorrow.

 Seeking ideas and support from and working with organisations and communities outside Stradbroke, such as the Mid Suffolk Council, Suffolk Association of Local Councils (SALC), Royal Society for the Protection of Birds, The Woodland Trust, etc.

Some ideas for Stradbroke:

- More tree planting
- Rewilding open spaces and roadsides, etc cutting costs
- Gardening for wildlife and biodiversity
- Leading in and encouraging sustainable maintenance practices and materials
- Increasing recycling
- Changing to renewable electricity for parish council assets
- Installing solar panels on parish council assets
- Replacing bulbs with LEDs, reducing bills
- Installing EV charging points and encouraging EV use
- Encouraging more cycling and walking opportunities for healthier living
- Leading the next generations towards a cleaner, safer future

In addition to our Stradbroke Parish Council site, we are developing a Facebook page on Stradbroke Community website.

We are looking forward to Radio Stradbroke and Stradbroke Monthly publicising our work, resources and useful links, etc. We will set up a task force of parish councillors and volunteers to plan strategies and ideas, audit sustainable practices, monitor and review. The most important things are commitment and action.

I propose we declare a climate emergency and begin our work today.

# Agenda Item 21.03.17 (a) Tabled correspondence:

### Comment 1:

Last week I saw a lady fall over on the path in New St. Later I went to use the grit bin that used to be in the church yard, which I could not find unless it was covered in snow. Are there no grit bins in the village now. In the future in the event of snow being forecast, could the council arrange with Suffolk Highways to grit the road into the Doctors car park. We are lucky that the village is on a Priority 1 gritting route, it would only need for them to reverse in up to the swimming pool and grit on the way out.

### Comment 2:

Hello PC,

How or who would be best placed to organise the placement of grit bins in and around the village? In the recent weather, the approach to the medical practice has been particularly treacherous. Even to myself as a fit forty something, I do wonder how the elderly and infirm, managed to negotiate the approach to the medical centre when they have no choice but to endure the appalling compacted ice on the roads and the foot paths.

## Clerk's action:

Report made to Suffolk County Council asking whether the road outside the Health Centre can be included on the gritting route, as the vehicles already grit Wilby Road. A response is awaited.

#### Comment 3:

Is it possible for the Council to arrange for the police to carry out speed checks on Queen Street as you enter/leave the 30mph zone.

### Clerk's comment:

If Councillors agree, the Clerk can make contact with Suffolk Police and ask them to undertake a survey of the area. If the Police consider the speeding to be an issue then this area will be added to the area covered by the SafeCam team — alongside Laxfield Road and New Street.

#### Comment 4:

I hope you are well. You may remember being copied into an email with myself and Jeremy Fox regarding our communication on speed and lorry watch in Stradbroke last year.

As Chair Person of the Parish Council for the village, I wanted to ask you if there has been any investigation into implementing a 20mph speed limit through the central village area on Queen Street in Stradbroke?

Once again I find myself sitting here facing the road while working from home and witnessing a large number of vehicles speeding past the old garage site as they approach the primary school. Not only are there speeding cars and vans, I am also witnessing a large amount of heavy goods vehicles, bulk haulage lorries and articulated lorries approaching this bend at speed.

I am aware there is a '20 is plenty' sign by the entrance to the primary school but it appears to make no difference. Given the location of the primary school on the bend and the narrow road that cuts through residential properties on Queen Street + local amenities including the post office which has no pavement directly from the entrance, I find it really concerning that there is no proper speed restriction or traffic calming through this part of the village.

I am aware that the Department for Transport would consider introducing more 20mph limits in built up village streets that are primarily residential, although they do not tend to look at B roads unless in exceptional circumstances. I would think given what I am witnessing on this stretch of road day in day out, and in particular with a primary school, this would be something to be considered. Am sure you are aware of the increase in heavy goods vehicles, bulk haulage lorries and articulated lorries coming through the village – The current 30mph limit should be reviewed in light of this? The breaking distance will be significantly greater for vehicles of this size and weight to that of a regular car.

Look forward to your help and thoughts on this matter. Many thanks,

### Chair's response:

Apologies for the delay in responding.

Yes we have investigated the possibility of a 20mph speed limit for Stradbroke – similar to the one in Eye.

It is a possibility and we met with Suffolk County Council Highways before the lockdown to discuss this. Part of the issue is that normally 20mph limits don't get approved on B roads and lorry routes. We would also need to demonstrate strong public approval and provide recent evidence on traffic speeds.

We did do a survey last year on what measures the public would like. This could form a part of evidence we need but the usual public meetings that we would have held had to get put on hold due to the pandemic as did the traffic surveys. We can hopefully now pick these up again and I've asked our clerk to put this on the agenda for our March meeting so we can have another discussion.

The other thing I think is important to note is the May 6<sup>th</sup> Suffolk County Council elections. Suffolk County Council as highway authority are actually the council that should be responsible for these kind of things. They have the resources and professional expertise to work on this kind of project. In my view in recent years they have become more and more willing to try and push their responsibilities onto town and parish councils. We certainly have no issue gathering local support and championing traffic issues but we do need SCC to be able and willing to deliver. I will certainly be asking the candidates for election to SCC questions about what they would be prepared to do to help Stradbroke's traffic issues and what financial resources that would be willing to promise. I would like to see them promise to support a 20mph speed limit and other traffic measures.

Election time is sometimes the best time to try and tie down our local councillors to a commitment to move forward on this. This is what was done in Eye and I would like to see a similar commitment from candidates for Stradbroke. So we will be making sure the issue is on the agenda for our meetings in March through to the elections and working on what we can do to move the proposals forward into action.

I would also add that the Parish Council is very active in opposing planning applications in Stradbroke and beyond that generate additional traffic – in particular HGVs and tractors. We have had some success with this although as you can imagine the applicants are not always happy with us as a consequence!

Thanks again for writing to me about this. You would be very welcome to attend the next Council meeting on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> March from 7.30pm and I wondered if you wanted to consider saying something in the public forum. This might help to demonstrate to any county council candidates that there is public concern on this topic. If you did want to speak Odile our clerk can send the necessary invitation to the meeting.

# **Comment 5:**

Thanks for your quick reply to my note. It is encouraging to hear that moves are being made to address the traffic problems in Stradbroke, and in particular on Queen Street. I think it is also worth pointing out the state of the current road signage also — I took this photo earlier this week as just one example of how poor the situation is on Queen Street at the area by the primary school. As a resident here it seems that it is a forgotten part of the village with little care for the safety of the residents and also the children who occupy this area on a daily basis. Perhaps the school itself could also be instrumental in helping make this area safer for everyone?

I'd be happy to join the meeting on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> March to contribute, with a view to highlight this important issue. I am concerned it is only a matter of time before a serious accident will happen on this part of the village.

**Clerk's comment:** If Councillors feel the matter is urgent, and as SCC are not doing the work, it is recommended that a company is sought who can carry out cleaning and bramble cutting back.
